
WASHINGTON, D.C. — More than 70 consumer, energy and manufacturing organizations today [sent a letter](#) to leaders of the United States Senate and House of Representatives urging them to exercise Congressional Review Act (CRA) authority to overturn six waiver rules from EPA authorizing the State of California to impose costly electrification mandates for vehicles, small engines, ports and marine vessels.

The letter notes: *“Each of these [California] rules carries significant implications for consumers, fuel producers, equipment manufacturers, the maritime industry and the broader U.S. economy. Policies of this magnitude should be decided by Congress, not a single state.”*

Organizations signed onto the letter raised the following points as well:

- **American Fuel & Petrochemical Manufacturers (AFPM)**

“Mandates and bans that start in Sacramento don’t stop at California’s borders. They raise costs for consumers and manufacturers, limit choices and threaten energy security for Americans around the country. Congress should pass all six CRA resolutions to stop California bureaucrats from imposing their agenda — and their prices — on the rest of America.” – Chet Thompson, President and CEO, American Fuel & Petrochemical Manufacturers (AFPM)

“These waivers would allow California’s vehicle, small engine, and marine-related mandates to affect consumers across the country. Waivers issued by EPA during previous administrations allowed California to enforce rules imposing incremental vehicle electrification mandates, port and marine vessel electrification and emissions rules, and small gas-engine bans, policies with far-reaching costs and consequences for American manufacturers, consumers and U.S. national security. Other states are able to enforce California's vehicle and maritime regulations as their own.
